#### ODI

ODI's <u>Research and Policy in Development Programme</u> undertakes research, advisory work and public affairs on a wide range of issues broadly around maximising the use of research based evidence in development policy and practice. Key publications / resources include: <u>Bridging Research and Policy in Development: Evidence and the Change Process</u>, a book describing some of the early research, some analytical tools and recommendations for researchers.

<u>Bridging Research and Policy in International Development: An Analytical and Practical Framework</u>. A briefing paper summarising the above

<u>Helping researchers become policy entrepreneurs</u>. A briefing paper outlining a practical approach researchers can use to develop a strategy for policy engagement.

RAPID supports two networks across developed and developing countries:

- 1. the <u>Evidence-based Policy in Development Network</u>: individuals and organisations interested in how to maximise the use of research-based evidence in development policy and practice; and
- 2. the <u>Outcome Mapping Learning Community</u>: individuals and organisations using and developing outcome-mapping tools to improve the impact of their work.
